Hi girls,

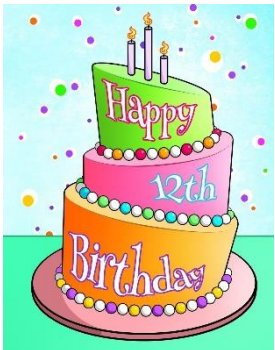
